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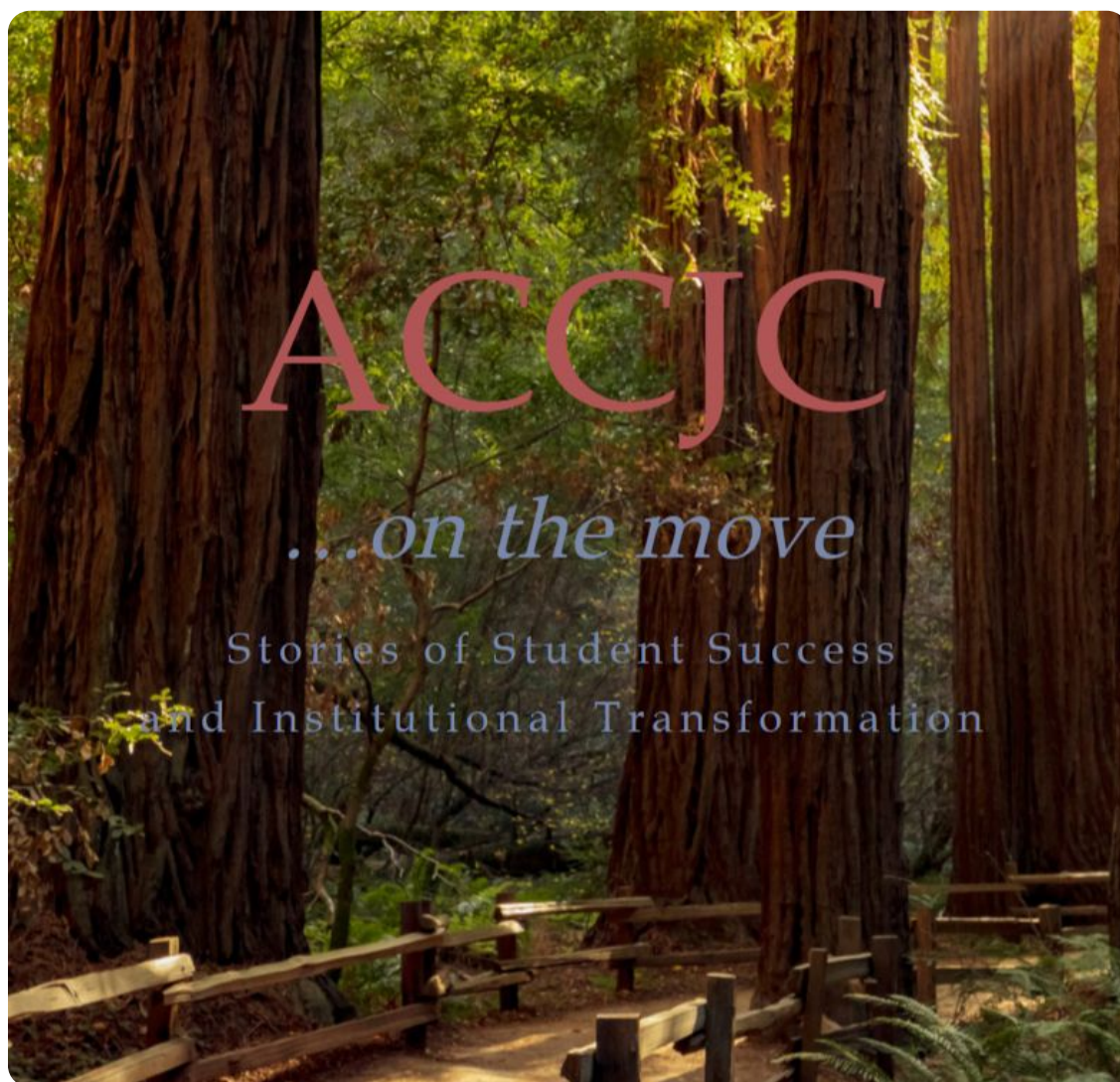
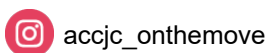

Folsom Lake College is a California public community college in the Los Rios Community College District, serving over 10,000 students at three campuses in Folsom, Placerville, and Rancho Cordova.

Beyond its academic strength and physical beauty, the College's Innovation Center is an amazing discipline-agnostic hub for instructional innovation, and a general education makerspace.

The Los Angeles Community College District includes nine colleges, serving a quarter of a million students, in communities covering 900 square miles, and is the nation's largest community college district.

If that data sounds impressive, so too is the district's commitment to student success! The district is advocating at the local, state, and federal level, and working to provide affordable housing solutions to housing-insecure students.

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[Santa Barbara City College](#)

Santa Barbara City College was founded in 1909, and is one of the oldest California Community Colleges. Today it is a designated Hispanic-Serving Institution and serves over 17,000 full-time students at its three campuses.

The college is committed to serving its students beyond the classroom. In October 2022, they opened the Dream Center, a space where undocumented and mixed status students can receive legal assistance, academic assistance, financial assistance, access to community resources and more.



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
