**ASCC Spring 2013 Semester
Highlights Enhanced

With the spring 2013 semester at the American Samoa Community College (ASCC) now in its third week, the College's students, faculty and staff have remarked on the contrast between this semester's registration and the difficulties they experienced at the beginning of the fall 2012 semester, when a combination of factors led to long lines and a confusion over correct procedure. The relative ease with which this semester has gotten underway underscores how the challenges faced the previous semester represented an anomaly in the College's registration process rather than an indication of long-term difficulties.

Ms. Grace Tualafono, head of the ASCC Management Information Services (MIS) division, explained that most students adapted easily to the updated pre-registration process, which allowed them to set their spring 2013 class schedules online well before the end of the fall 2012 semester. "Our new system eliminates a few steps from the previous pre-registration process," she said, "and this allowed the lines to move much faster. This time around, by noon each day the lines were short, whereas in the past they often remained long right until the end of the working day." Mrs. Sifagatogo Tuitasi, head of the Admissions, Records and

Financial Aid Office (ARFAO), also remarked on the efficiency of the new system. "The hands-on functions of our staff haven't changed," she explained, "but online registration works so well that for the most part manual registration was only necessary for students with issues they needed to resolve with us in person."

The College's computerized registration system now successfully integrates data from the individual departments involved in the process, including not only the ARFAO, but also the Business Office and Academic Affairs. "Before, each department collected and managed its own data," recalled Tualafono. "Now, through sharing the responsibilities of a common database, they've become accustomed to collaborating on online registration as well as other functions of ASCC. I personally feel that the biggest contribution to the successes seen thus far is their willingness to work together." Tualafono predicts that the system will become even more efficient and user-friendly as MIS is given time to refine it. "Registration will continue to improve as we integrate more of the student and advisor features of our software system," she said. "For now, our next goal is to enable students to register from anywhere on or off campus where there's an Internet connection."

Tualafono emphasized that along with the enhanced computerized system, a major factor in efficient registrations is students becoming familiar with how to best use that system. "The more prepared a student is,

whether it be completing document submissions, or making sure their balances are cleared, or being informed about ASCC processes and deadlines prior to registration, the smoother the registration process will go for them," she said. "I would recommend that any student call or visit the campus prior to registration to ask questions about our processes and check whether they have any holds, need to see a Financial Aid counselor, or need to take care of any other issues that might slow them down during registration."

ASCC Expands Teacher Education Resource Center

Teacher Education majors at the American Samoa Community College (ASCC) now have access to an expanded Teacher Education Resource Center (TERC) located on the second floor of the ASCC Library. “The ERC mainly serves the needs of those students who are Teacher Education majors both in the AA and B.Ed. Program,” said Teacher Education Department (TED) Director Dr. Lina Galea’i-Scanlan. “As a new B.Ed Program, we need to ensure that we have the resources available to help our students do research for their courses, particularly at the 300-400 level.”

The TERC currently contains approximately 5000 printed items, which include reference books as well as books which can be borrowed, periodicals and, journals. It also has computers available to serve the educational needs of teachers and students, and enough chairs and tables to accommodate between 30 and 40 people. Additional construction to the room, currently in the works, will create space for approximately 3000 more printed materials currently in storage awaiting the arrival of additional shelves.

Dr. Galea’i-Scanlan explained that the TERC has been in development for several years, and has grown along with the TED program. “I initially worked with our former head librarian Dr. Steven Lin on the collection,” she recalled. “He would send us book catalogues and we would order

books for the different content areas. He also helped us with ordering of materials as well.” The course content of the TED classes often incorporate resources found at the ERC. “It’s been a part of our classes requirements that students use the ERC for research,” she said, “and TED faculty also use the TERC for research assignments for their classes.” With the opening of the TERC, Teacher Education majors now have a total of four computer labs available for their use, as well as the Student Learning Assistance Center and all other learning resources available to ASCC students.

Elvis Zodiacal, a former Social Science instructor who now serves as an Assistant to the Library Director, has observed the usage of the TERC since the beginning of the current semester, and says that it is growing in popularity among both TED and non-TED majors, as well as instructors at the College. “We have a few students majoring in other subjects utilizing the TERC resources,” he said, “but priority is always given, if need be, to our Education Department instructors and students. So far, both TED and non-TED instructors have made reservations for their classes to visit the TERC and learn about what it has to offer.” The TED subsidized construction of the TERC room, while the educational materials it contains were funded by both the TED and the College.

The opening of the TERC represents just one of many strides ASCC has made towards the establishment of a four-year Bachelor in Education or B.Ed. degree. The College has worked

in collaboration with the Accrediting Commission for Senior Colleges and Universities (ACSCU), a division of the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) towards accreditation of the four-year Teacher Education program, which has been in development for many years. The TED has progressed to “Candidacy for Accreditation” status with the ACSCU, the last step in the process before full accreditation, with the next ACSCU site visit currently scheduled for March.

While the TED program awaits full accreditation, five ASCC students have already received their B.Ed. degrees in spring and fall 2012 under an existing arrangement with WASC. With the end of the degree’s long development and accreditation process now in sight, Dr. Galea’i-Scanlan said her department’s next goal is to make more of American Samoa’s young people aware of the TED and its programs. “We take pride in having established a homegrown four-year degree program developed specifically with American Samoa’s own educational situation and needs in mind,” she said. “We sincerely hope the community will consider what we now have to offer and will support our long-term goal of providing quality training for our Territory’s future educators.”

**ASCC Students Awarded
NMSAS Scholarships**

As the National Marine Sanctuary of American Samoa (NMSAS) grows, among its ways of serving the community is to provide scholarships to American Samoa Community College (ASCC) students studying Marine Science. The Marine Science Program at ASCC has offered an Associate of Arts with an emphasis in Marine Science and a Certificate of Proficiency in the Marine Option Program (MOP) since 1999. The Associate of Arts (AA) has been replaced by an Associates of Science (AS) in Marine Science as of fall 2012, which focuses more closely on Marine Science rather than the more general AA. Non-Marine Science majors can enroll in marine science courses to fulfill general life or physical science requirements, or enroll in the MOP Certificate program, allowing them to explore Marine Science without changing their major.

Charles Miller, an ASCC graduate who majored in Criminal Justice, took the opportunity to explore the Marine Science Program without changing his major, and has since received funding for two years from the NMSAS to attend UH Hilo as a Marine Science major. Charles became interested in Marine Science through his involvement in the Toa o le Tai program run by the NMSAS that provides swimming instruction and Marine Science lessons to students at

Samoana High School. He initially enrolled in MSC280 (Marine Science Special Projects), which is an intensive field-based course modeled after the University of Hawaii's Quantitative Underwater Ecological Survey Techniques (QUEST) course. MSC280 students can earn a QUEST certificate which is recognized by UH.

While staying a Criminal Justice major, Charles also enjoyed learning about Marine Science and found he had a passion for field work. This led him to an internship with NMSAS which turned into a temporary full time employment position upon graduation. Charles impressed his mentors at NMSAS enough to be awarded a scholarship to attend UH Hilo for his Bachelors in Marine Science. The scholarship provides \$10,000 of support per year for two years (provided academic performance is satisfactory), and requires eight weeks of interning for NMSAS per summer as well as a commitment to return and work for NMSAS for at least three years upon completion of the Bachelors program. This scholarship program is an excellent example of how to both encourage and retain American Samoa's brightest young minds who want to bring their skills back to help their community.

Another recent recipient of a scholarship to study Marine Science from NMSAS is Meghan Tanuvasa, who received funding to enroll in several Marine Science courses at ASCC. This is one way the NMSAS and ASCC work together to encourage and enable interested students to pursue an education in Marine Science. Both Meghan and Charles were selected for these scholarships based on

their performance in their internships at NMSAS.

Living on a small island in the world's biggest ocean as we do, it makes perfect sense to cultivate in our young men and women a passion for understanding marine ecosystems. The NMSAS and the ASCC Marine Science Program hope to continue to support and guide local youth towards realizing their dreams of a career based on their passion for the sea.
