Public Law 112-56, VOW to Hire Heroes Act of 2012

On November 21, 2011, the President signed Public Law 112-56, the VOW to Hire Heroes Act of 2011. Included in the Law is the Veterans Retraining Program for unemployed veterans. VA and the

Department of Labor (DoL) are working together to roll out this new program on **July 1, 2012.**

A brief summary of the new law is outlined below:

- Be between the ages of 35-60
- Be unemployed (as determined by the DoL) with special consideration given to veteran who have been unemployed for more than 26 weeks.
- Have any other than a dishonorable discharge.
- Not eligible for any other VA educational benefit program (e.g. the Post 9/11 GI Bill, Montgomery GI Bill, and Vocational Rehabilitation & Employment Assistance).
- Not be in receipt of VA compensation due to unemployability.
- Not be enrolled in a federal or state job training program.

This program is limited to 99,000 participants who may receive up to 12 months of payments 2t the full-time Montgomery GI Bill-Active Duty rate (currently \$1,473 per month).

Participants must be enrolled in a VA approved program of education offered by a community college or technical school. The program must lead to an associate degree, non-college degree, or a

certification and train the veteran for high demand occupation.

Applications will be submitted through DoL and benefits paid by VA. DoL will provide employment assistance to every veteran who participates, upon completion of their program. Note: The key is...must be enrolled in a VA approved program of education offered by a Community College or Technical School as stated above. The program begins July 1, 2012. Please visit the GI Bill website www.gibill.va.gov or GI Bill Facebook page for more details on when, where and how to apply.

ASCC PTK Students Represent American Samoa at National Conference

Four students in the American Samoa Community College (ASCC) chapter of Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) Honor Society recently returned from this year's PTK Annual Convention held April 12th-14th in Nashville, Tennessee. PTK President Sophia A'asa, Vice President Marietta Lafaele, Treasurer Roseanne Felise, and Public Relations Secretary Krissie Vailolo proudly represented the Territory at the prestigious event, which attracted an estimated 4,000 Society members from across the nation and was described by the official PTK web site as "one the largest gatherings of Phi Theta Kappans under one roof in recent history". "We wanted to attend this event not only to represent American Samoa," said

A'asa, "but also to learn how we can make our Alpha Epsilon Mu Chapter a Five Star Chapter, learn about more scholarship opportunities for our members, receive leadership development, and seek advice on how we can establish a PTK Alumni Association." To pay their representatives' way to the convention, the PTK started fundraising during the fall of last year. Their bake sales became a familiar sight on the ASCC campus, they took in a percentage of revenue from the tickets they sold for the "So You Think You Can Sing 2" competition, they sold barbecue plates, and they solicited donations of monetary support and airline miles from generous community members.

Their hard work paid off with the four representatives re-establishing American Samoa as a presence on the national PTK scene. "The highlight for me personally was carrying the American Samoa Flag in front of 4,030 people during the Opening Ceremony on April 12th," A'asa enthused, "and having everyone recognize that American Samoa's chapter was back in the game! As an entire group, our highlight was that we were able to represent ASCC amongst the brightest students that community colleges around the nation had to offer. Furthermore, we were able to bring back scholarship opportunities and contacts for our members and the students of ASCC who wish to continue their education abroad." The ASCC students networked with other PTK chapters, trading ideas on community involvement, becoming a Five Start Chapter, and starting an association for PTK alumni. They also had the pleasant surprise of discovering their own niche in PTK history. "One of our regional coordinators, Charlotte Toguchi, mentioned that ASCC's PTK Chapter is one of the earliest chapters chartered within the South Pacific Region, and we have Mr. Jim Sutherland to thank for that," A'asa explained.

A'asa encouraged students who think they could qualify for PTK membership to seek advice from the existing members. "Students should be interested in the PTK because there are over \$37 million worth of scholarship opportunities available to them," she said. "Over 600 universities offer discounts and scholarships for PTK students. Furthermore, just being a member makes you feel like you belong to something greater, and helps you strive to be the best you can be. For example, there is this program called 'Competitive Edge' on the PTK website which is a self-development plan at one's own pace. Only members can access it, and they can start at any time. It helps you develop skills that you want to obtain for a certain job, as well as life-long skills like critical thinking and so forth. There are just so many benefits and they can all be viewed on www.ptk.org."

A'asa acknowledged the much-appreciated assistance of many ASCC faculty, staff and administrators, businesses and community members. "Without their support, we would not have been able to represent American Samoa at the Convention," she said. Tax Office Recognizes ASCC Business Students

Between January and April of this year, 18 Business students at the American Samoa Community College (ASCC) volunteered to work at the Tax Office assisting members of the public who needed help filing their taxes. This past Wednesday, Tax Office auditor Maryjane Olo visited the ASCC campus to present these students with certificates of appreciation on behalf of her director Melvin Joseph and the rest of the department.

"For the past five years, ASCC Business students have provided assisted us, but this year we had more of them than ever before," said Olo before calling each student forward to receive his/her certificate. "In a program which benefits both the Tax Office and the College, this time the students exceeded our expectations." Olo pointed out that even though the students were each required to spend 20 hours assisting the public with tax filing, many chose to continue their service well past that. In fact, student Ruta Lealasila spent a total of 60 hours working at the Tax Office.

The students volunteered their time as part of the Service Learning project of their Business class Payroll & Taxation (ACC 152-A) taught by Ms. Athena Mauga. "Helping the public file their taxes gives the students an opportunity to develop effective communication and management skills by handling many different situations and circumstances," said Business Department Chairperson Dr. Faofua Fa'atoafe. "They also develop competency with the necessary technology and learn to use teamwork to solve problems and bring about results."



Student Ruta Lealasila, who spent the most time at the Tax Office, said the experience will come in handy with her regular off-campus job at the Diocese of Samoa, Pago Pago Finance Office. "Now I understand the importance of maintaining accuracy of tax information when doing a payroll, especially with the necessary deductions" she said. Lealasila has also become something of an authority on which tax forms members of the public should use for different circumstances. "Not everyone here has a clear understanding of how to do their taxes," she recalled. "Most people were very grateful for my help, but the only problem was listening to the complaints when some of them found out they had to pay instead of getting a refund."

At Wednesday's brief ceremony, ASCC Service Learning Coordinator Elisapeta Fa'alafi-Jones reminded the Business students that knowledge becomes most valuable when combined with experience. "We need young men and women who understand what goes on out in the community," she said. "It's very commendable for our students to provide this service, but I also give credit to the Tax Office for giving them the opportunity to gain this experience. Effective Service Learning depends on those whom we serve being willing to receive us. By spending many more hours than they needed to at the Tax Office, these students have shown not only how willing they are to learn, but also how their hearts are with the community."

The ASCC Business Department has long strived to combine classroom learning with experience in the outside world. Other examples this semester include Dr. Fa'atoafe leading members of the class Marketing and Management Practicum (MKT 212) on a ten day tour of businesses and factories in the Independent State of Samoa over the College's Spring Break, and more recently, members of her class Business Communication in the Workplace (BUS 150) gaining as much experience with foreign countries as possible without actually going there by giving group presentations on the culture, art, and economies of Japan, Korea, India and Mexico.
