




ASCRF's Tsunami Remembrance Project by *Anna Iosefo*

As flags were flown half-staff to commemorate the 2009 tsunami victims, the American Samoa College Research Foundation (ASCRF) Student Association also did their part by initiating their 2nd Annual Tsunami Remembrance Project.

Members of the Foundation Association presented a poster for signatures, messages, and testimonies from the students, faculty, and staff of the American Samoa Community College (ASCC) in front of the school's main entrance.

"We used this event to get in touch with the students of ASCC and to give back to our community, all while remembering the loss of our people," said Ariel Toluao, ASCRF Student Association member.

The Association distributed over five hundred cupcakes and provided face paintings to ASCC students, faculty and staff, as means of enticing students to partake in their project.

"Over 300 people showed up to our commemoration—which is pretty great," said James Maae, ASCRF Student Association President. "As an association, we would like to emphasize the idea of giving back to the community through simple acts of kindness."

Members wore purple in remembrance of the tsunami victims, and with over 300 signatures, they asserted their project a success. A donation jar was set up by the signature sheet, and all funds that were donated will be given to the local Red Cross.

"The ASCRF Student Association was established as a supporting group to the ASCRF," said Tiare Tupua, ASCRF Former Administrative Assistant.

Part of the Association's mission is to provide assistance to the students of ASCC and to support the programs and services of ASCC. Aside from its tsunami remembrance project, the Association has fundraised extensively to offer assistance to prospective graduates and has steered towards its vision to promote academics, raise awareness of scholarship opportunities, and establish a network of communication while utilizing available resources.

"The ASCRF Student Association plans to continue the tradition of honoring the tsunami victims of the tragic event on September 29, 2009," said Maae. "We will be hosting another tsunami remembrance project next year, and I hope you can all have the chance to support us again."

- 2. ASCC Catalog Instead of guessing what classes you need to take for your major, just click on the ASCC Catalog tab and get the right information you would need.




American Horror Story: Freak Show Review by: Uperesa Fakava


Murder House, Asylum, and Coven are all installments of the popular, American Horror Story. Finally, after seven months of waiting, it is back with its latest season: Freak Show.

TRASH


