Campus Talk: "Graffiti"

With the semester coming to a close and the huts repainted with the "words" written on them gone. We asked a few people about how they felt about Graffiti.

Dwight Seumanutafa.

How do you feel about Graffiti?

DS: Awesome, its art. As long as it doesn't say a stupid word but is a picture, it's ok.

Did you know that there was a No Tolerance policy* on Graffiti? (*if you are caught, you are penalized without question.)

DS: No, I did not know that, because you know, security guards see kids do it and don't really care.

Do you Consider Graffiti art?

DS: Yes, it's an expression of emotion, it helps relieve stress. People get mad at certain things and graffiti is a good outlet for that... not that I've done that sort of thing.

How do you feel about Graffiti?
