The American Samoa Community College (ASCC) reached a milestone in its history with the official opening of its new Multipurpose Center (MPC). The new multi-story building will serve as the center for the system of support provided to ASCC students by the College's Division of Student Services. Governor Lolo M. Moliga, the Board of Higher Education, and numerous local dignitaries joined the administration, faculty, staff and students of ASCC for the official dedication of the MPC, which took place on Tuesday, January 9th.

In addition to Governor Lolo, guests included former governor Togiola Tulafono, President of the Senate Palaie Gaoteote, Representative Tumolimoli Moliga on behalf of the Speaker of the House of Representatives, Cabinet members, ASG Directors, CEOs, Presidents of other local institutions, Senators and Representatives of the Fono, Board of Higher Education Trustees, Department of the Interior representatives, and former members of the ASCC staff.

Instructional Programs:

<u>Catholic Education Week</u>: As part of the celebration of Catholic Education Week, ASCC-ACNR was invited to present on its programs and career opportunities at St. Theresa Elementary School on Wednesday, January 31, 2018. ASCC-ACNR Instructional Program representative Eirenei Tesimale, Forestry Program representative Denis Sene, and ACNR Student/Forestry interns Anastasia Magalo and Imeleta Luamanu presented to more than 80 students, four teachers and Fr. Kolio Etuale. The goal of Catholic Education Week was to expand and broaden students' learning experiences to inspire and motivate them to prepare for brighter futures and achieve success.

Research:

ASCC-ACNR - Counting All Those Mosquitoes: The Polynesian tiger mosquito, one of the most abundant species in American Samoa, is a nasty carrier of dengue, filariasis, and other diseases. Because it is restricted to the islands of the South Pacific, it receives relatively little attention from researchers in the U.S. and elsewhere. Effective traps are important research tools for entomologists, and until recently there was no effective trap for the Polynesian tiger mosquito. This changed in 2008 when Entomologist, Dr. Mark Schmaedick at ASCC-ACNR discovered that a trap designed in Germany for another species was also effective for catching Polynesian tiger mosquitoes. As new traps continue to be developed and old designs improved, ASCC-ACNR continues to test their efficacy for trapping local mosquitoes. This month they conducted an experiment comparing the 2008 trap to a newer model that is similar to the older one with a few modifications. After three weeks of trapping, sorting and identifying a total of 5,870 mosquitoes, it was determined that the new design was similar in efficacy to the older trap. Although the new trap has some other advantages in a more sturdy construction and more protection from rain, it doesn't outweigh the simplicity and ease of operation of the existing standard. So the ACNR Entomologist and researchers will stick with the old version for now, but will keep a lookout for new options to try out against American Samoa's disease vectors.

ASCC-ACNR Taro Improvement Project: Over the past several years, ASCC-ACNR Horticulturalist, Dr. Ian Gurr, has been working on a taro improvement project with the goal of developing new varieties of taro that have the following three characteristics: disease resistance, high yields, and good eating quality. The project involves traditional crossbreeding methods, where good eating quality taro that are susceptible to taro leaf blight (*lega*) disease are cross-pollinated with high yielding, disease resistant taro. From each cross, hundreds of new varieties are produced and evaluated to identify those that have each of the three desired characteristics. Recent evaluations have identified two varieties, which are promising and currently being micropropagated in the ASCC-ACNR Tissue Culture Lab by Emily Ilaoa, ACNRs' Plant Tissue Culture Lab Manager. In the tissue culture lab, one plant can be multiplied into thousands in a few months. The goal is that these varieties will eventually be released to our local taro farmers.

Extension:

<u>ASCC-ACNR Working with DOH and ASEPA in Supporting Dengue Response Efforts</u>: As the New Year begins, American Samoa continues to battle one of its longest lasting dengue outbreaks ever. The Department of Health is redoubling its efforts in educating the public and offering assistance to remove and mitigate the water-holding containers, such as tires, buckets, drums, etc. where the dengue-carrying mosquitoes multiply. At the same time, the department is evaluating additional measures to stem the outbreak, including carefully targeted and limited use of pesticides.

Improper pesticide use can harm human health and the environment, so applicators must have the knowledge and skills needed to use these chemicals safely. That is where ASCC-ACNR Agricultural Extension Program Manager, Autagavaia Tunai Alfred Peters comes in. Assisted by colleagues at the American Samoa Environmental Protection Agency, for over 20 years Peters has provided pesticide applicator safety trainings to farmers, pest control officers, national park invasive species control teams, the American Samoa Power Authority, and others whose work requires pesticide use. The trainings normally are offered every three months, but when the request came from DOH's Emergency Preparedness and Response Division to provide safety training to DoH's vector control team, Peters immediately contacted Tualagi Gaoteote, EPA's Environmental Specialist in charge of pesticide applicator training and certification.

Together, the ASCC-ASEPA team was able to deliver an intensive combined lecture and hands-on training in pesticide application to ten DOH vector control and emergency response staff to help them prepare for an emergency vector control operation in the Manu'a islands. Only those trainees who passed the rigorous written exam at the end of the training were awarded American Samoa Pesticide Applicator certifications, thus ensuring that any vector control pesticide applications in Manu'a or anywhere in American Samoa will be done by trained professionals in a manner that is safe for human health and the environment. When used carefully and properly, pesticides can provide important benefits in protecting our food supply, our health, and our environment. The ongoing collaborative ASCC-ASEPA pesticide applicator-training program helps ensure that those who use these chemicals in American Samoa do so in a safe and professional manner.



For over 20 years, ASCC-ACNR Agriculture Extension Program Manager, Autagavaia Tunai Alfred Peters, has worked tirelessly to protect our health and environment by educating farmers and other professionals on safe and proper pesticides use.

EFNEP Food Stamp Workshops: Since its inception in 1968, the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP) has helped millions of limited resource families and youth in the United States and its territories improve their diets by teaching them to plan and prepare nutritious meals that include a variety of foods. The EFNEP is part of the Cooperative Extension Services Family Consumer Science program under the Agriculture, Community and Natural Resources (ACNR) Division at ASCC. In partnership with the local Department of Human and Social Services (DHSS), the EFNEP conducts its lessons and food demonstrations at the Food Stamp Distribution office and approved vendor locations.

In January 1-5, 2018, the ASCC-ACNR EFNEP conducted its monthly Nutrition & Food Safety workshop, which included a food cooking demonstration and promotion of physical activity, to 213 ASNAP Authorized Recipients. In the first five days of food stamp issuance, EFNEP paraprofessionals provided nutrition and food safety Lessons on: "My Plate" and the "The Importance of Hand-Washing to Fight Bacteria!" Each session consisted of physical activity - 15 minutes of mild Island – style exercises targeting an audience of adolescent to senior citizens. The food cooking demonstration was the highlight of the workshop. EFNEP clients tend to enjoy the class sessions even more when a recipe is provided with demonstration taste testing. In the beginning of 2018, EFNEP agents prepared a "Baked Shrimp Patty" that all food stamp recipients sampled.
